Being polite with a heart that rebels.

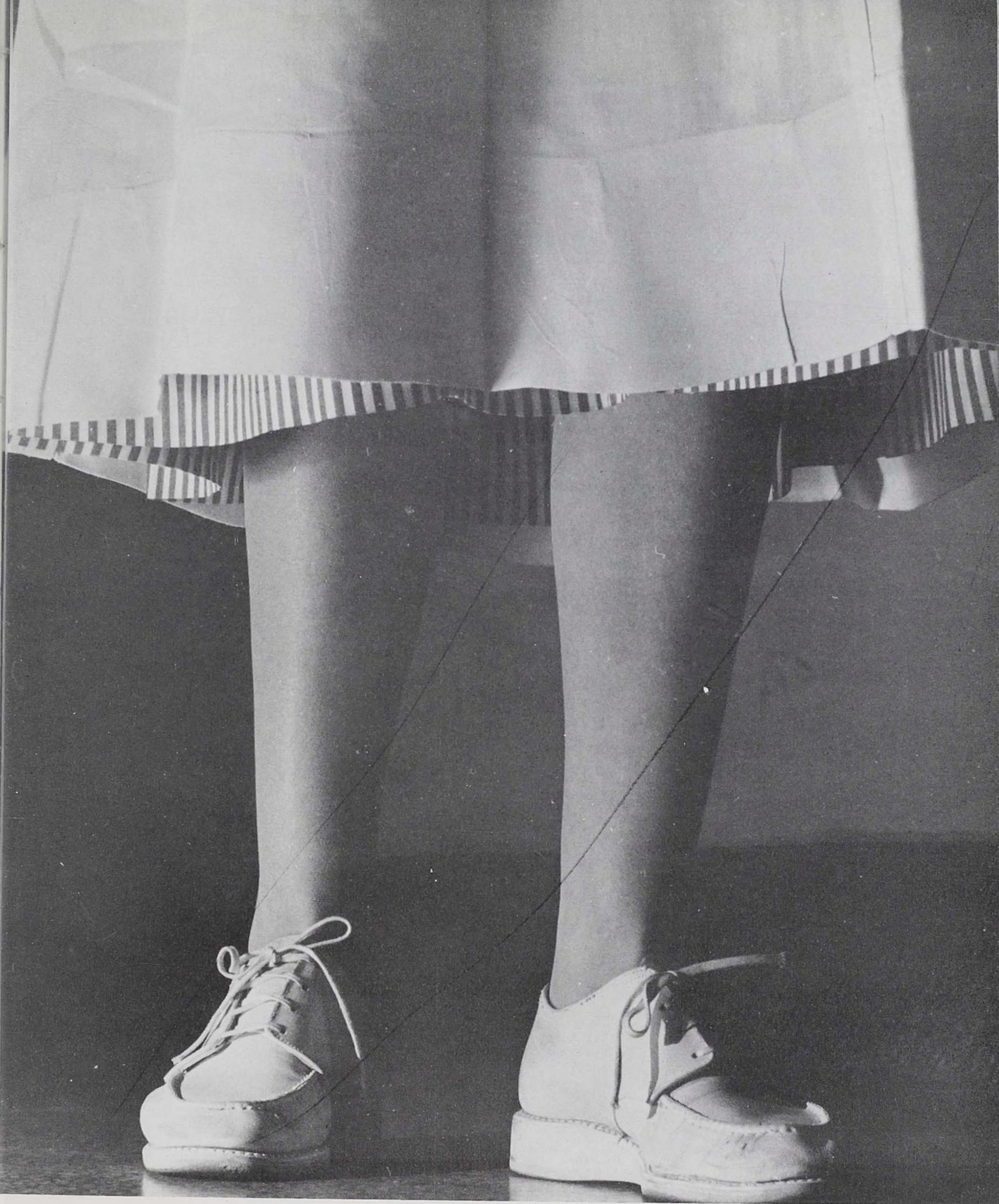
Longing for home and all the while

To guide us through the long months of training ahead, we have taken these words of encouragement as our motto . . . “They serve God well who serve His children.”





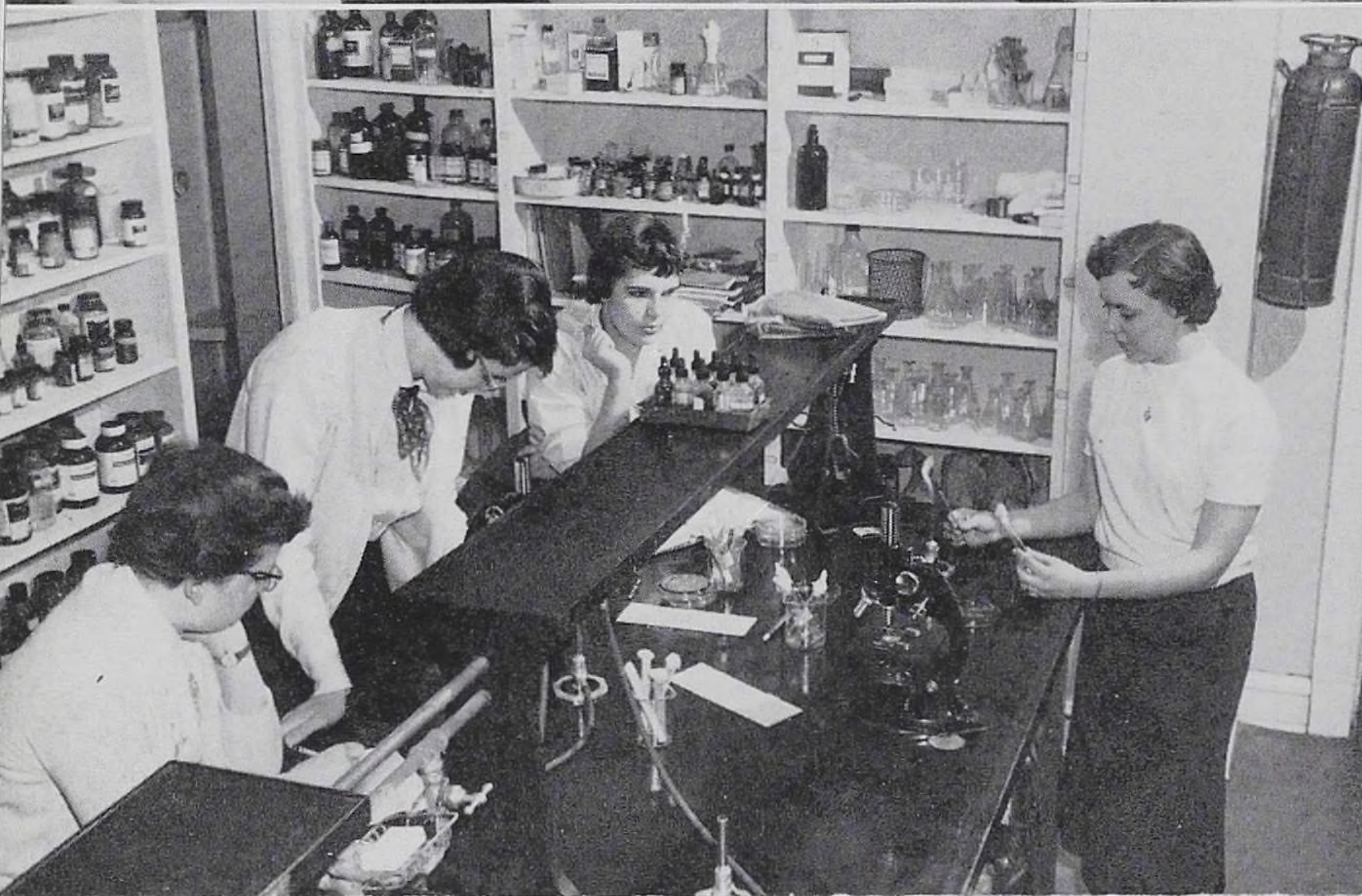

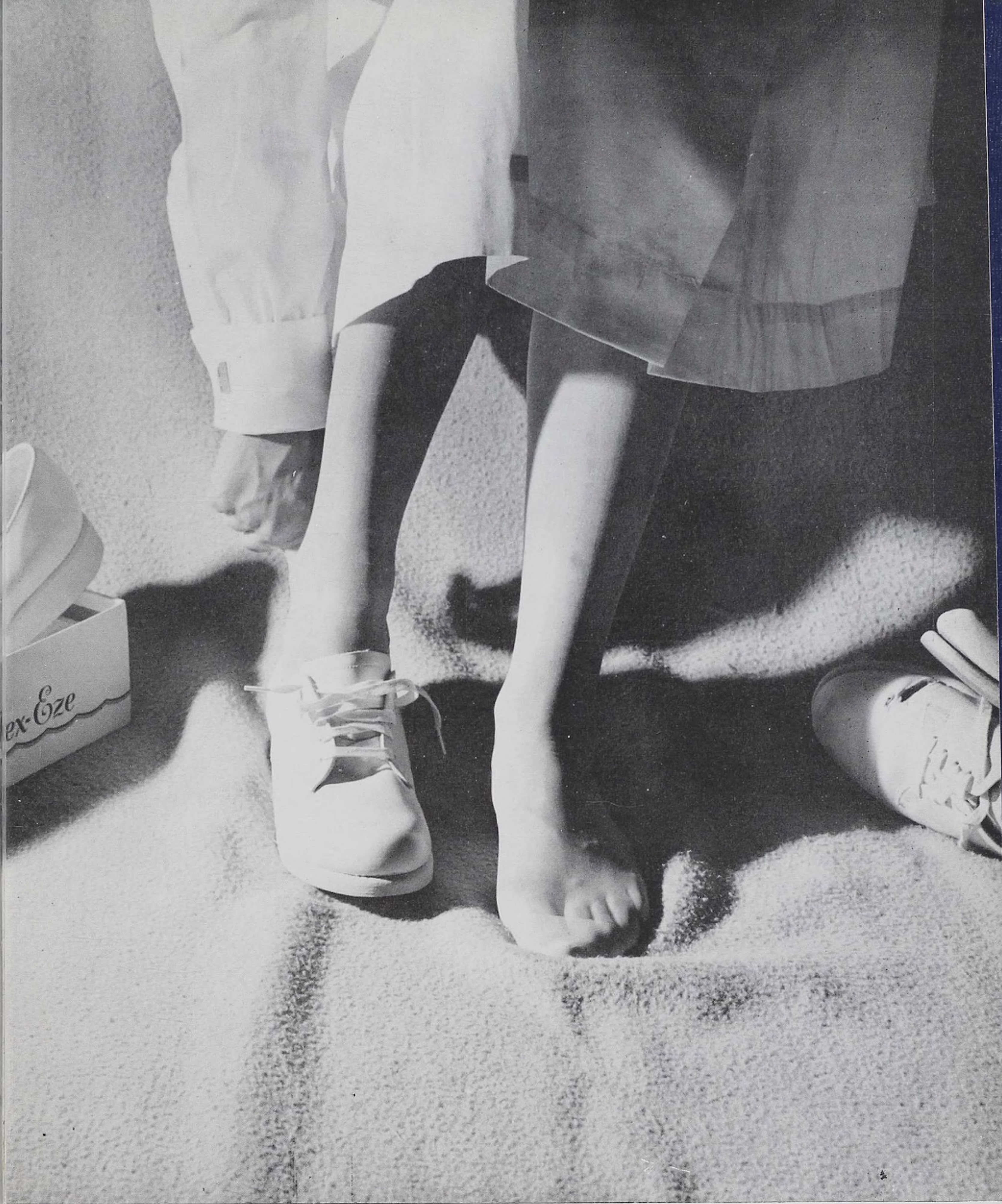
Proudly we displayed our wares for bake sales and bazaars, and proudly we wore our best bib and tucker for the Junior-Senior banquet.

Now, proudly, we exchange the blue and white for all white. That great day has arrived and . . .

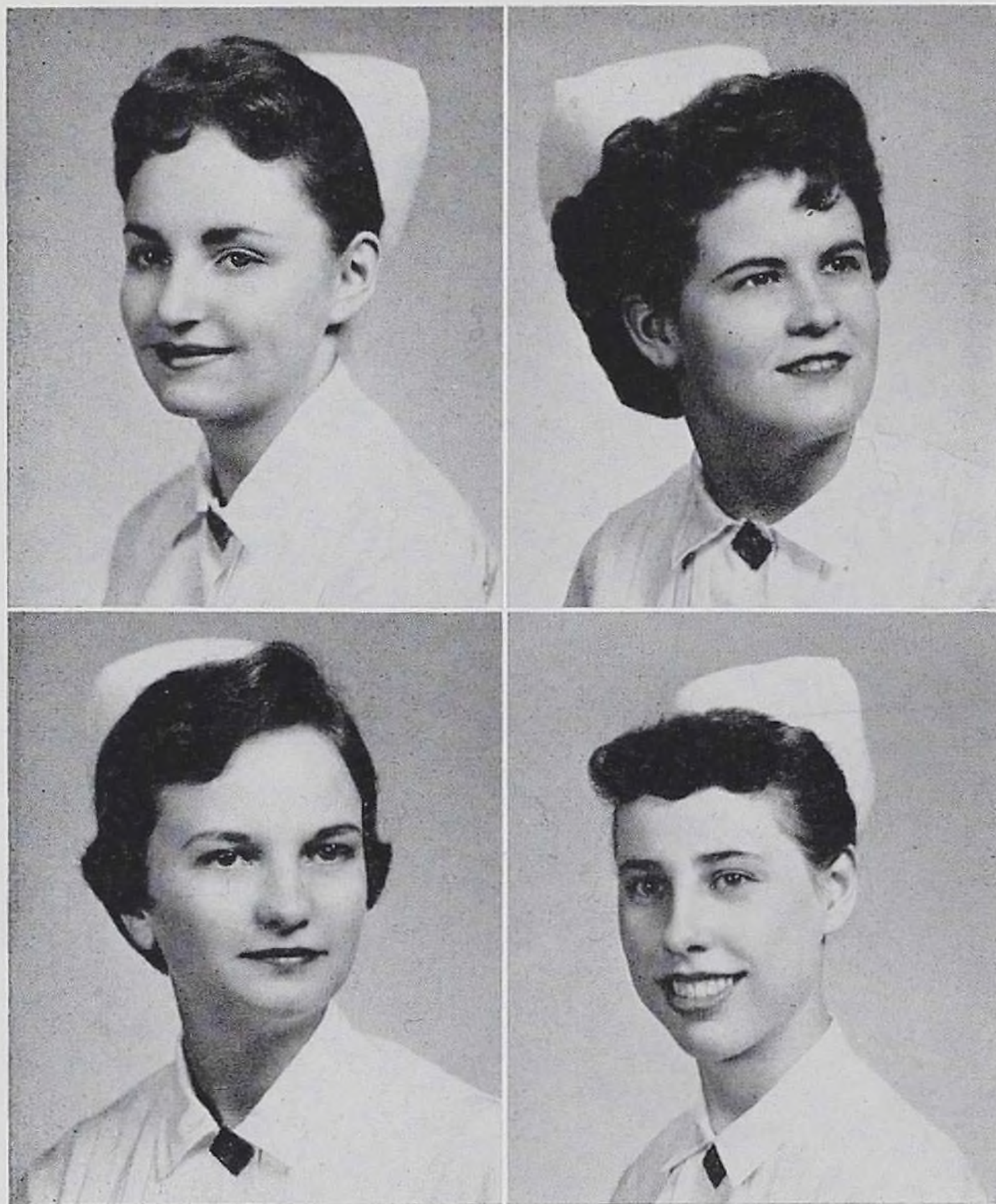
