Have you ever looked at an unfamiliar door and wondered what was on the other side?

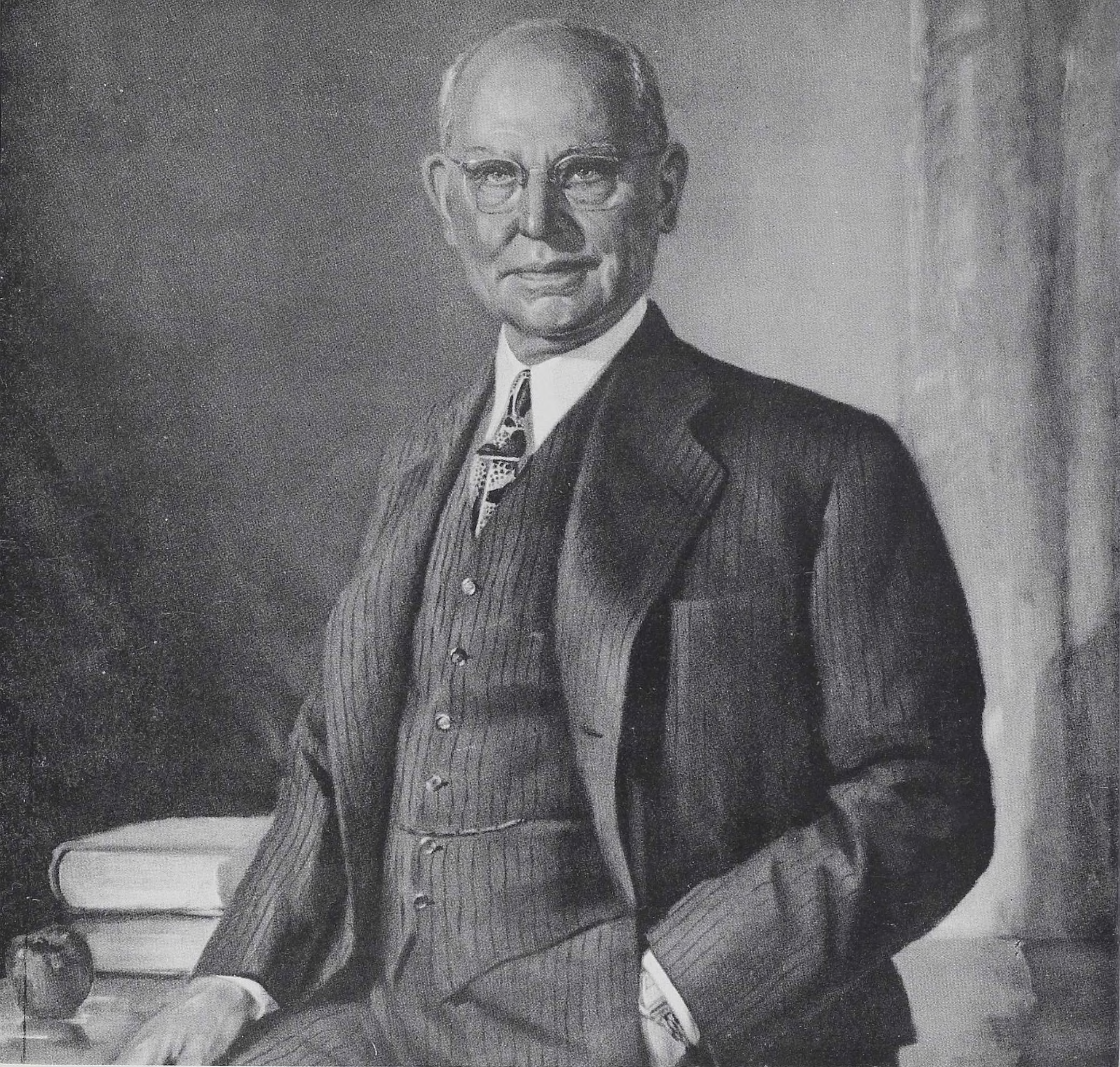
As you step through these doors you will see the progress of Augustana Hospital, the life of each student nurse, and all the people who form the body of this institution.

Our Diamond Anniversary

Augustana Hospital was opened seventy-five years ago in May 1884 admitting its first patient on the 28th day of the month.

The hospital derives its name from the Augustana Lutheran Church which was established in America by Swedish immigrants.

The hospital's beginning was in a remodeled private home located at Lincoln and Cleveland Avenues with facilities to care for fifteen patients. The need for expansion soon became evident but several years elapsed before sufficient funds were available for construction of a more adequate building. The cornerstone was laid in September 1892 for a six story fireproof structure which was completed in 1894 with facilities for 125 patients. In the following decade an addition was built which increased the capacity to 200 patients.

Medical progress thus far was accredited largely to the leadership of Dr. Albert J. Ochsner who was becoming recognized as one of the most famous of surgeons. Later Dr. Edward H. Ochsner and Dr. Nelson M. Percy became associated with him and with the hospital as attending surgeons. As the hospital expanded the staff was enlarged to include other reputable physicians and surgeons who also made substantial professional contributions to the growing recognition of the hospital as a center of healing.

As demand for greater hospital services increased over the years new location was acquired by the hospital at Dickens Avenue and Sedgwick Street. On this site an eight-story building was erected in 1922 providing residence quarters for nurses and educational facilities for the school of nursing.

In 1926 the present main hospital building was erected with a capacity of 275 beds and facilities for the care of medical, surgical, obstetric and pediatric patients. The need for still larger accommodations soon was apparent and in 1951 a new west wing was built providing care for Obstetric and Gynecological patients. Other facilities provided in this new structure were a chapel, classrooms, Central Service department, gift and coffee shop, cafeteria, new lobby and offices.

The hospital, being accredited by state and national agencies, has throughout various periods of its history conducted educational programs for the training of doctors, nurses, technicians, and clergymen.

In these seventy-five years we have trained over 600 doctors, 2,200 nurses, 200 medical technicians and 300 clergymen. Contributions made by many hundreds of interested friends over the years cannot be adequately measured. They have come from far and near from both lay and professional groups to align themselves with Augustana Hospital. In these seventy-five years over 345,000 patients have been cared for.

In March of 1959, two additional floors were constructed in the west wing, the fourth floor being given to surgery and the fifth floor occupied by the laboratory. Both floors are ultra modern. Surgery was performed for the first time in the new Operating Room on April 22.

The progress of the hospital has been moving at a steady pace. God has led us steadily forward.

Thus old doors have been closed and many new doors opened. Through these doors new explorations and discoveries are yet to be made...

The Sixty-fifth Anniversary of Augustana Hospital School of Nursing

At the founding of the hospital, February 28, 1882, a Charter was issued authorizing the hospital, among other injunctions "to train well qualified nurses." The School of Nursing has endeavored to meet this call and challenge since its inception of 1894.

The first class, consisting of eight student nurses enrolled early in the fall of 1894. The course was two years in length, including one month of probation. Requirements at this time were meager, for there were no "standard-setting" bodies either on a state or national level. Training schools then in existence conducted nursing programs in keeping with the needs of the hospitals with which they were identified.

Doctors were the first teachers of nurses as well as our first writers of textbooks for nurses. Students at Augustana had doctors for their earliest teachers, and much emphasis was given to learning from the doctors and from working with and observing older nurses. Interest in the education of the nurse is characteristic today of the medical staff of Augustana Hosp.

In the spring of 1896 the first class of nurses graduated, consisting of eight members. Graduation exercises were held in the Hospital Chapel. The class wore their student uniform. The picture of that earliest uniform contrasted with the present day uniform, is pictured elsewhere in this book.

Before the opening of the School, a paper was published by the hospital, in 1888, in an attempt to acquaint the public with the hospital and its needs. The paper was called "The Good Samaritan." This same theme animated a group of nurses a few years later in designing the school pin. Although the School of Nursing pin has undergone slight changes the original design based on the Biblical theme of the Good Samaritan, has remained unchanged.

From 1900 to 1909 many developments took place in the School: several nurses from the class of 1900 were the first to enroll in post-graduate work in Obstetrics taken at Chicago Lying-In Hospital; representatives of the classes of 1900 and 1901 called a meeting sometime during the year of 1901 to form what was to become the Alumnae Association. While only a few nurses were present, it was the beginning of "uniting for mutual benefit;" their official organ, the Augustana Nurse, was first published in 1903, with the first copies being written in longhand; in 1903 the first night superintendent was appointed; the class enrolling in 1904 was the first class to have 3 years of training; in 1909 the probationary period was lengthened to three months, and the curriculum was strengthened considerably.

In 1910 the Training School became eligible for state registration in New York, which was a great step forward. Three years later in 1913, the School required graduation from High School as a pre-entrance qualification, and was one of six leading hospitals in Chicago to have such a requirement.

Augustana nurses have been known to serve on many fronts of disaster and war, including the Spanish-American War, the flood of Dayton, Ohio, the San Francisco earthquake, Eastland Disaster of the Chicago River, and later in World Wars I and II. A number also responded to the call of the mission field.

It is significant that as early as 1921, a committee was organized to advise and assist the Superintendent of Nurses "in matters of Nursing and the Training School," consisting of a minister, two doctors, the Superintendent of the Hospital and the Superintendent of Nurses. The Nursing Advisory Committee today has much the same essential function but with broader representation.

As nursing education has advanced on a national plane over the past sixty-five years, so has it moved forward at Augustana Hospital. In 1952 the School of Nursing received National accreditation by the National Nursing Accreditation Service.

The School of Nursing believes its function is to serve God where He presents himself for man's service—a specific form of that service being to care for the sick and disabled. The faculty accepts this challenge and endeavors to operate a curriculum open to change and new knowledge, challenging the student to achieve satisfaction professionally and personally.

The aim of the school of Nursing is to select young women with aptitude for nursing, and provide such an environment and experiences as will help them develop their potentials for professional nursing.

The School offers both the diploma and degree programs. The basic three year diploma program includes instruction and practice in medical and surgical nursing, and obstetrics in the home school. Pediatrics, psychiatry and tuberculosis are acquired through affiliation. Affiliation with the Chicago Visiting Nurse Association is offered as an elective.

The degree program is in affiliation with Augustana College located at Rock Island, Illinois. The program is four and one half years, consisting of two academic years, one summer of College work, and two and one half years at the hospital where practice is obtained in the clinical areas. Upon completion of the program the student is awarded the diploma in nursing and the Bachelor of Science degree. The first students in the newly arranged program will enroll in the fall of 1959.

On September 3, 1958, eighty-eight students enrolled, which was the largest single class ever to enroll in the history of the School. Through 1958, 2,146 nurses have graduated from the School of Nursing. The School of Nursing has steadily moved forward over the years, and much credit goes to the early leaders of nursing, the doctors, the administrative body and devoted church leaders.

As God continues to lead, may many more new doors be opened for the advancement of professional nursing through the medium of Augustana Hospital School of Nursing.

The Veterans Administration Hospital at Downey, Illinois is primarily a psychiatric hospital; the average daily census is 2,350 veteran patients.

This hospital provides the setting for psychiatric nursing education for students from seven schools of nursing; the students have both academic and clinical learning experiences. In addition to the nurse faculty, members of all hospital disciplines contribute to the students' learning.

Opportunities are offered for the student nurse to develop abilities that would enable her to function as a staff nurse in a psychiatric setting, to further her understanding of inter-personal relationships, and to facilitate her personal growth and development. Major emphasis is placed on the significance and development of the nurse-patient relationship.

The affiliating student nurses, along with other nursing personnel, participate with professional staff members in working for the patients' comfort and welfare in the hospital and for their ultimate return to the community.
