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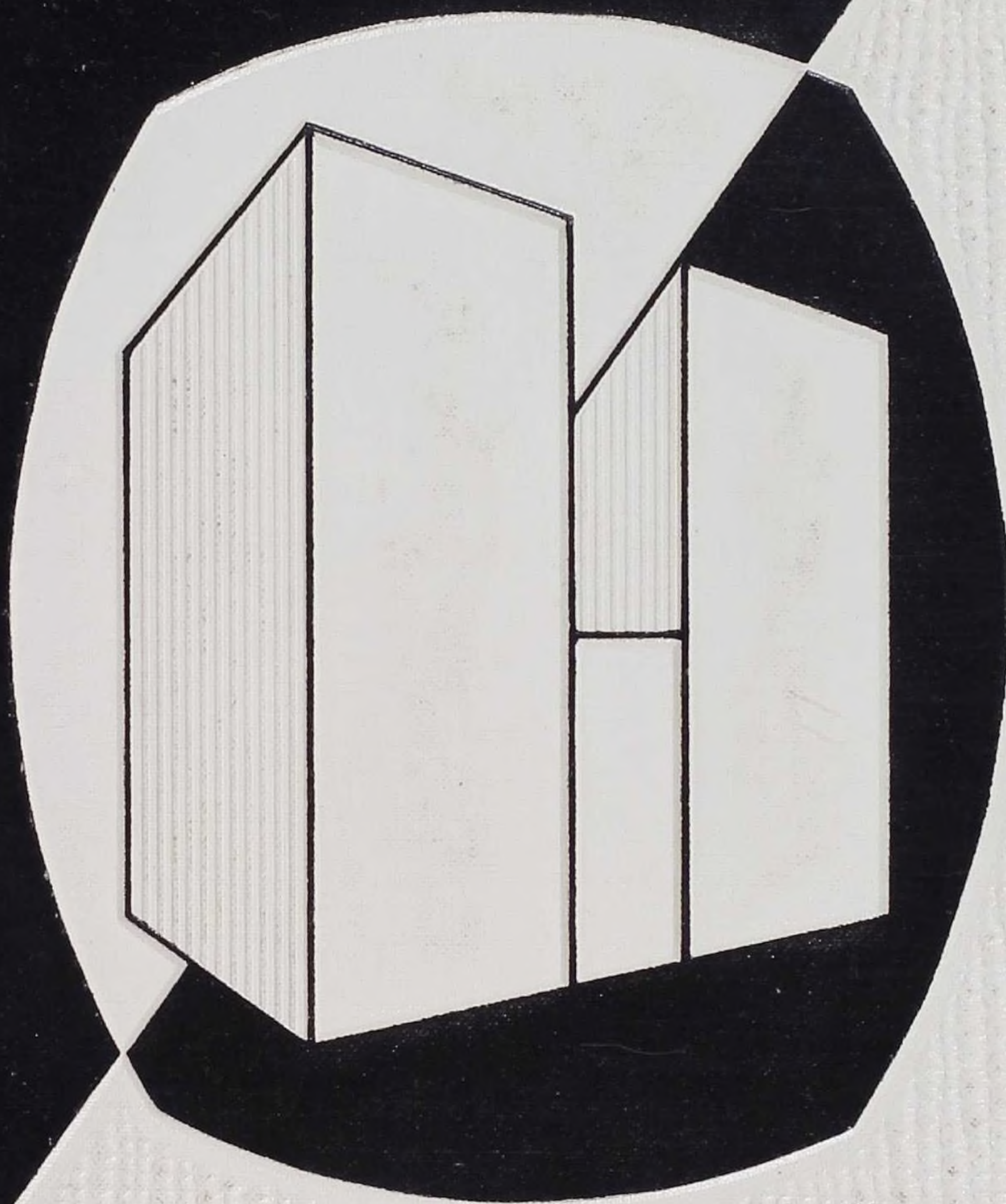

Memoriam

The above verse from an old hymn is the basis for this memorial to Miss Esther Latimer.

In September 1960, Miss Latimer came to the Augustana Hospital School of Nursing to serve as an instructor in Medical-Surgical Nursing. Her nursing career began when she received her A.B. from Geneva College in Indiana and entered Bloomington Hospital School of Nursing. Upon graduation from nurse's training she went on to obtain her Master of Public Health, University of Minnesota. During her thirty years of nursing practice, Miss Latimer's work included supervision, teaching and public health.

Whether you were friend or stranger, Miss Latimer acknowledged all with a pleasant smile and a warm cheerful greeting. Placing other's needs above her own, she seemed to have an inner strength and sense of calmness which guided her in the service of God and her fellowman.

When the formal classroom courses ended in June 1961, Miss Latimer left Augustana Hospital School of Nursing and entered the hospital where she passed away on August 11, 1961.

One of her favorite Biblical passages was John 14: Verses 1-3:

"Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in
God, believe also in me.
In my Father's house are many mansions: if it
were not so, I would have told you. I go to
prepare a place for you.
And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will
come again, and receive you unto myself; that
where I am, there ye may be also."

Then follows two and one-half years of feverish activity: study, growth; affiliations, more growth; not to mention dates, vacations' and planning for the future.

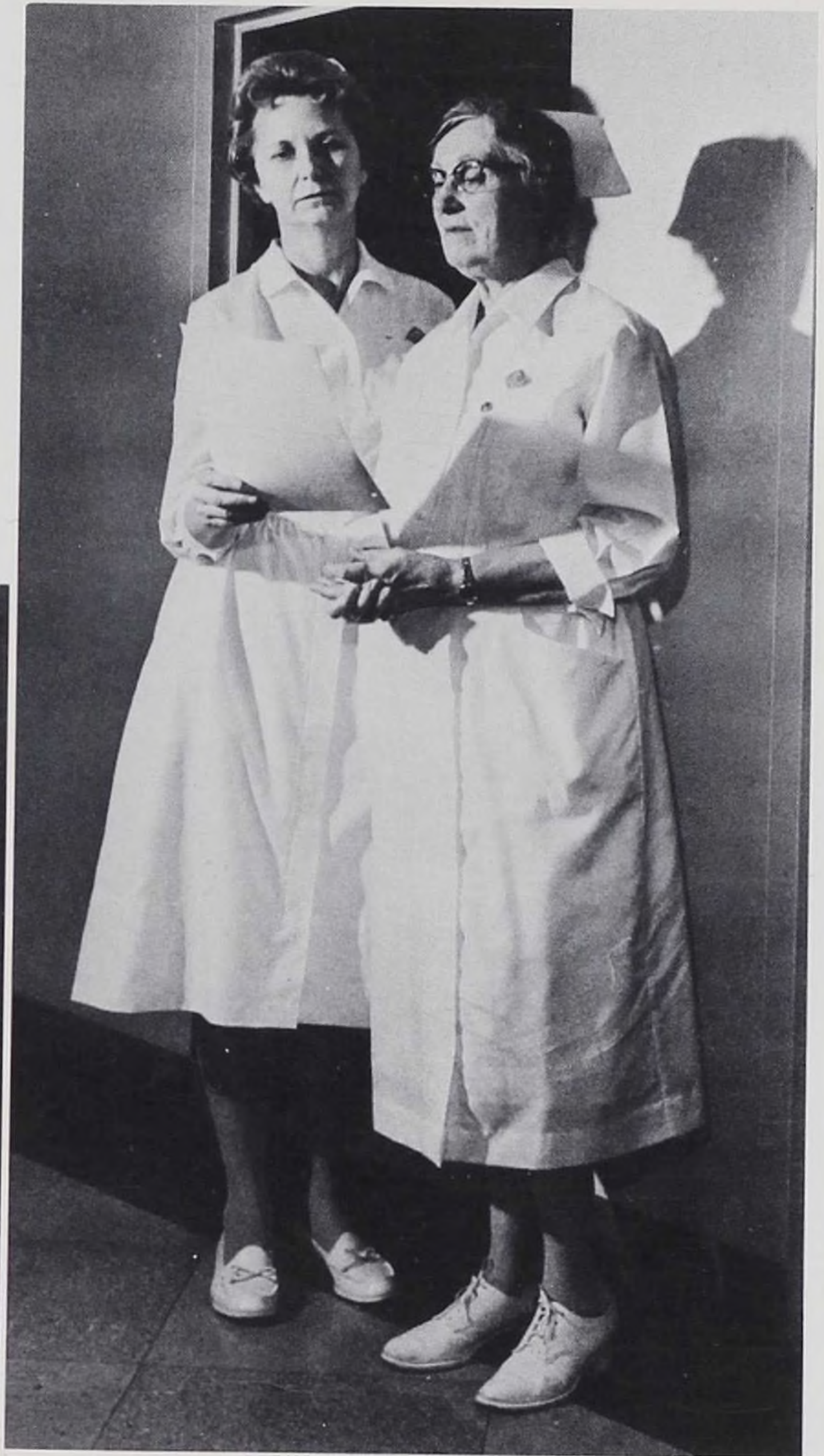
At graduation a student nurse dies, but a graduate nurse is born—truly the inseparability of day and night.

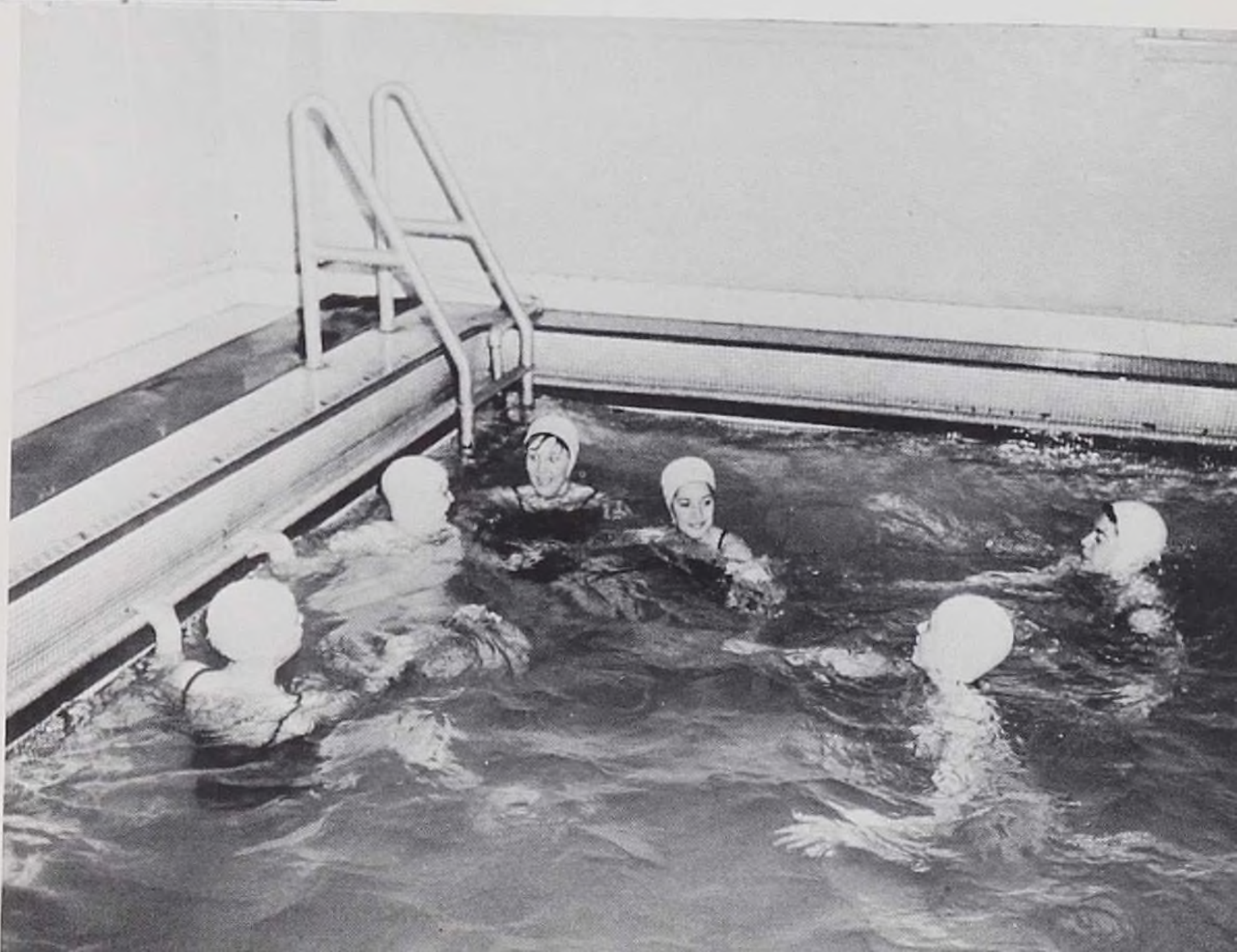


DANCING

On October 18, 1961, the class of 1964 made its first appearance in uniform at the annual Uniform Tea held in the Lounge of the Residence.

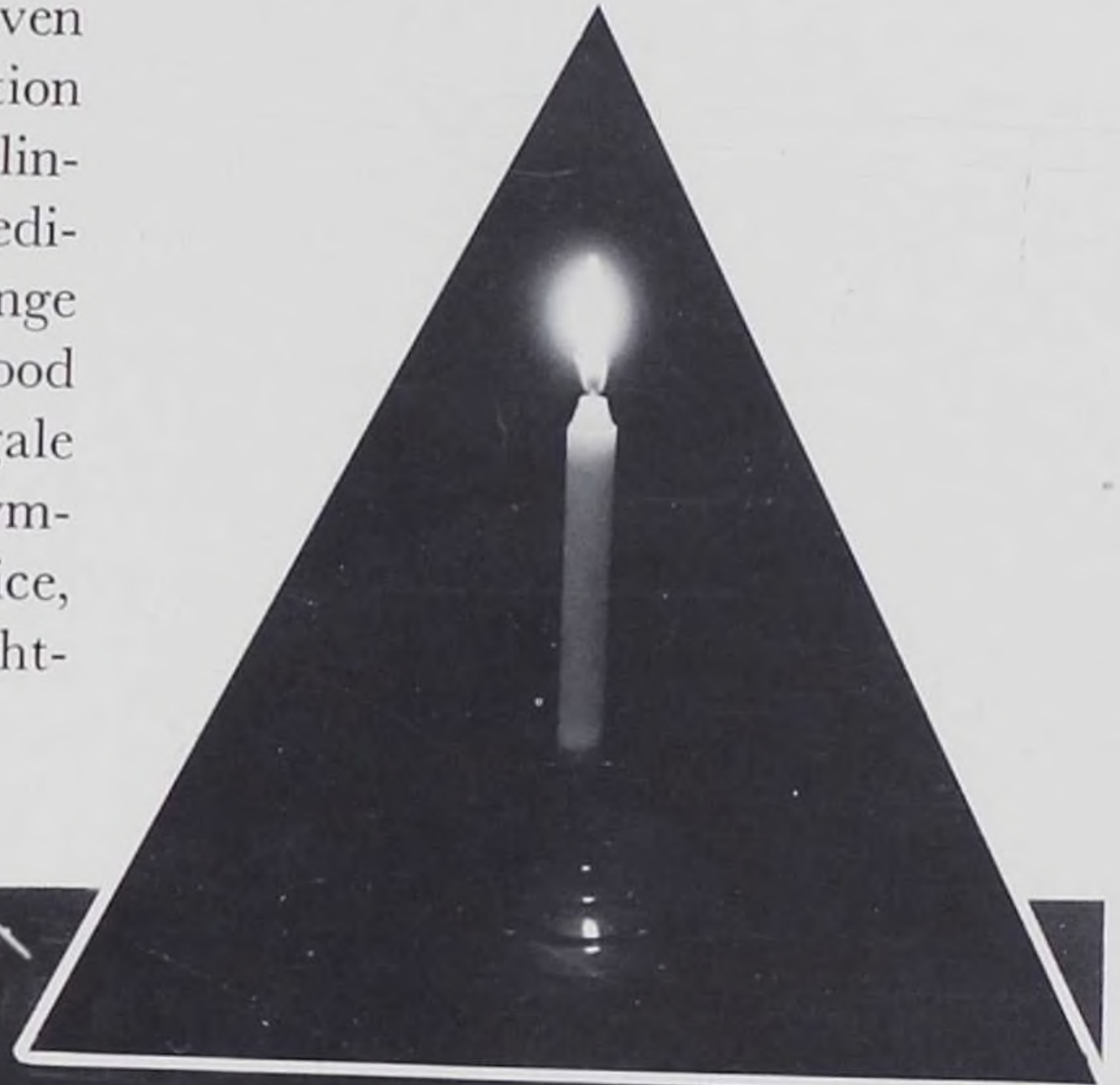
Members of the faculty and administrative group welcomed us and made us feel that we were now becoming a part of the nursing profession.

Many of us attended the gala festivities of the senior Prom at the Elks Club in April.



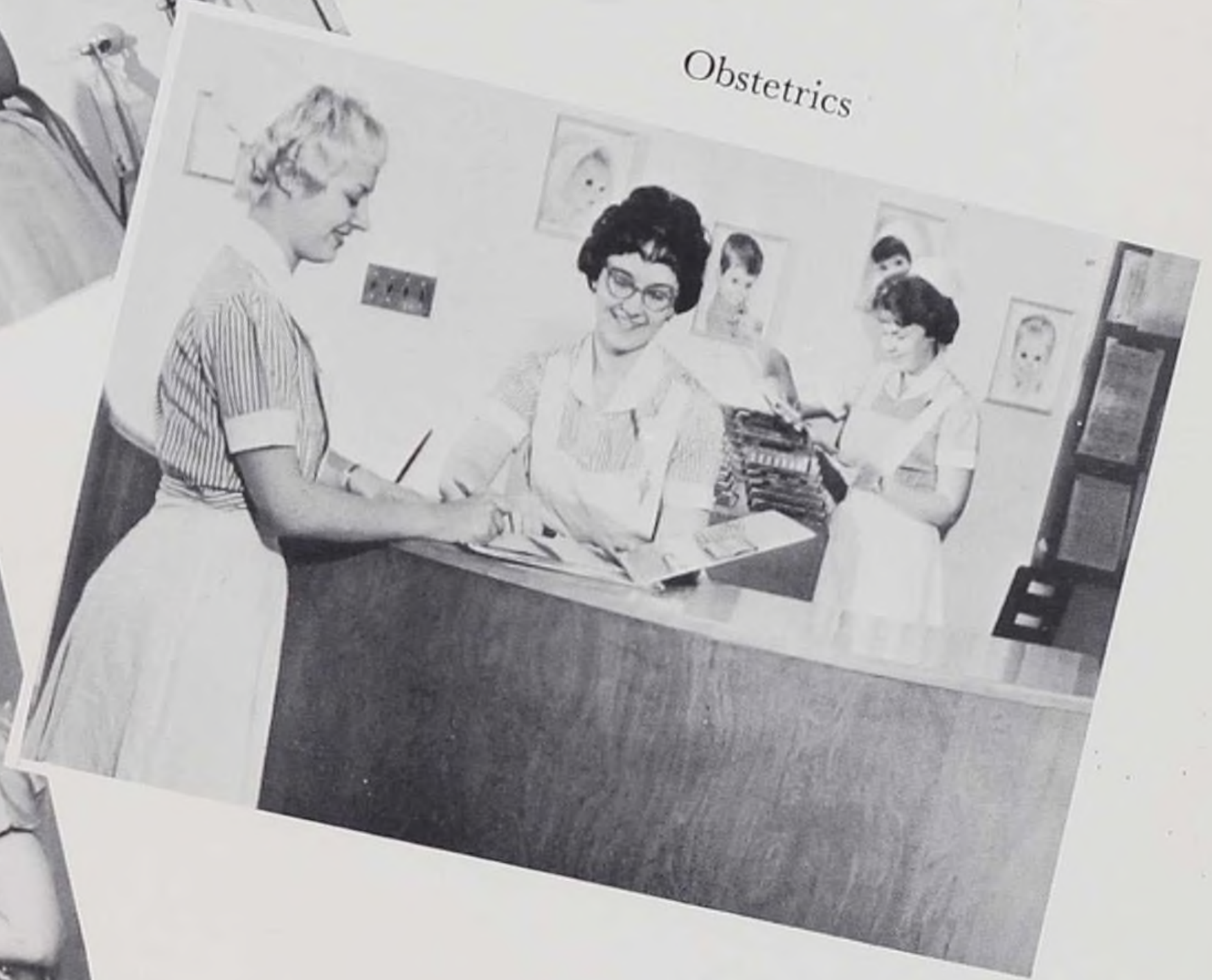
MAY

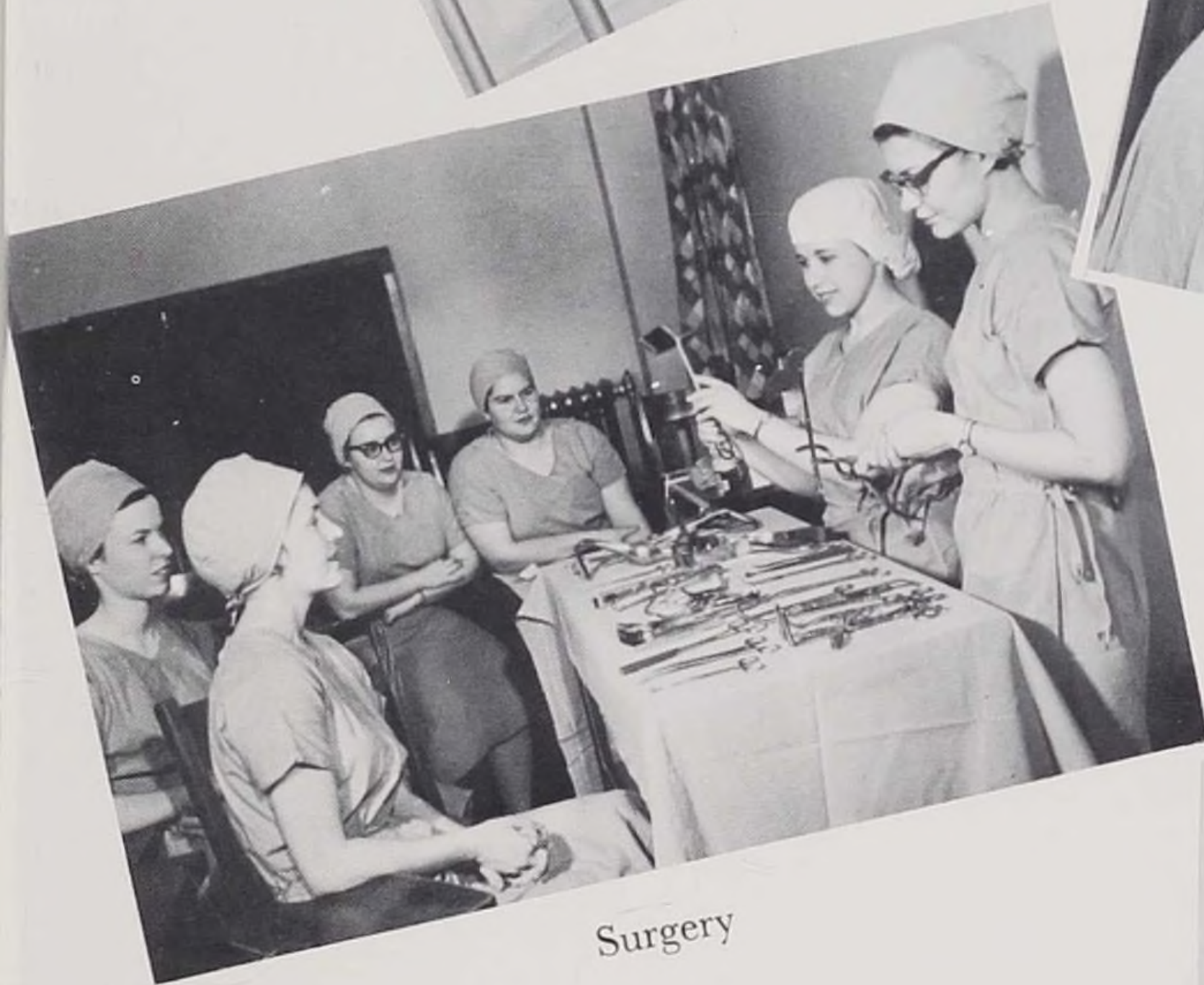

A pat on the back to the 1961-62 officers and advisors for work well done, and a hearty "Thank You" to the student body for supporting them.




Student-Faculty Council
