As each freshman lights her candle, thus ending the ceremony, she begins a new phase of her nursing experience.

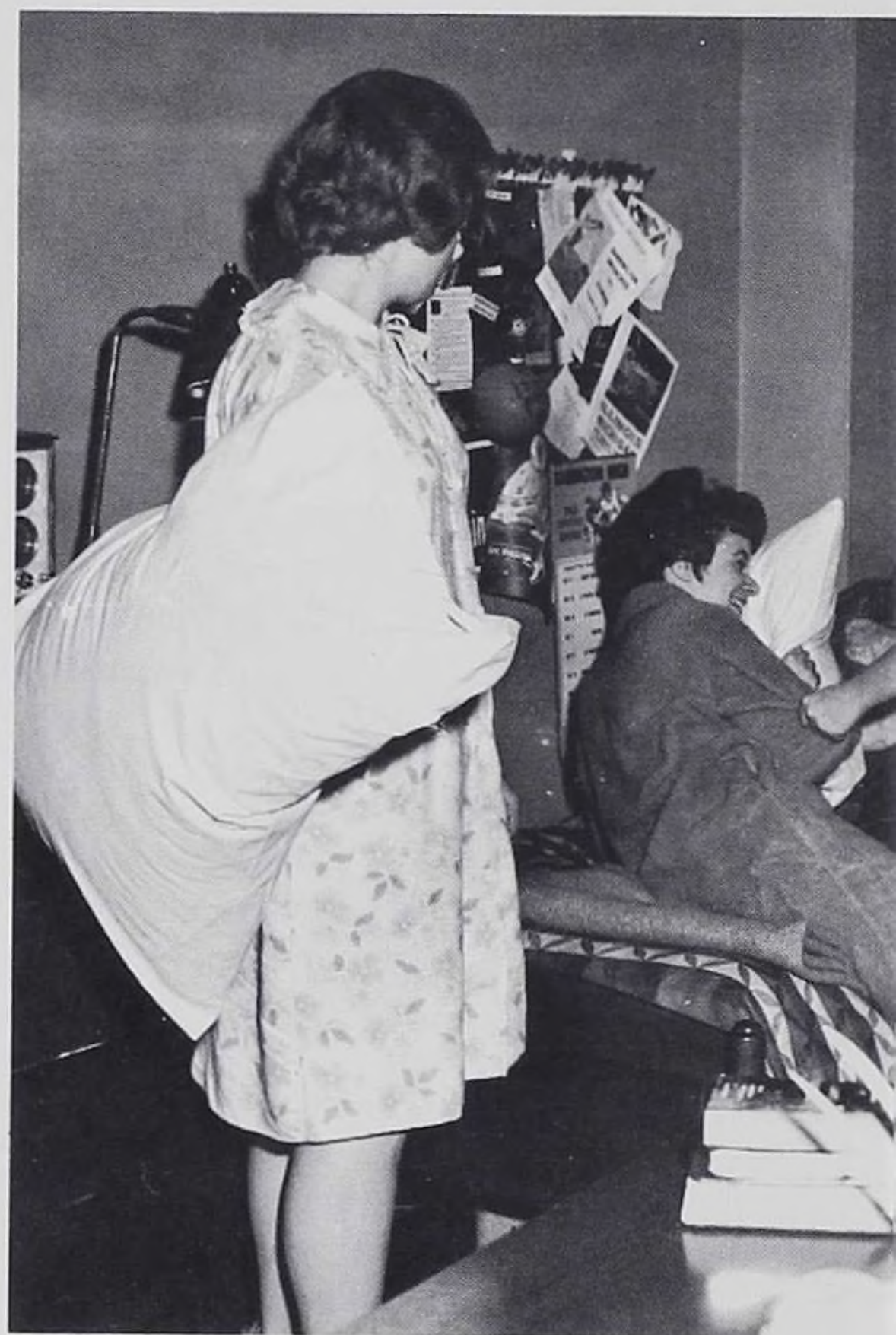

Another year has passed.

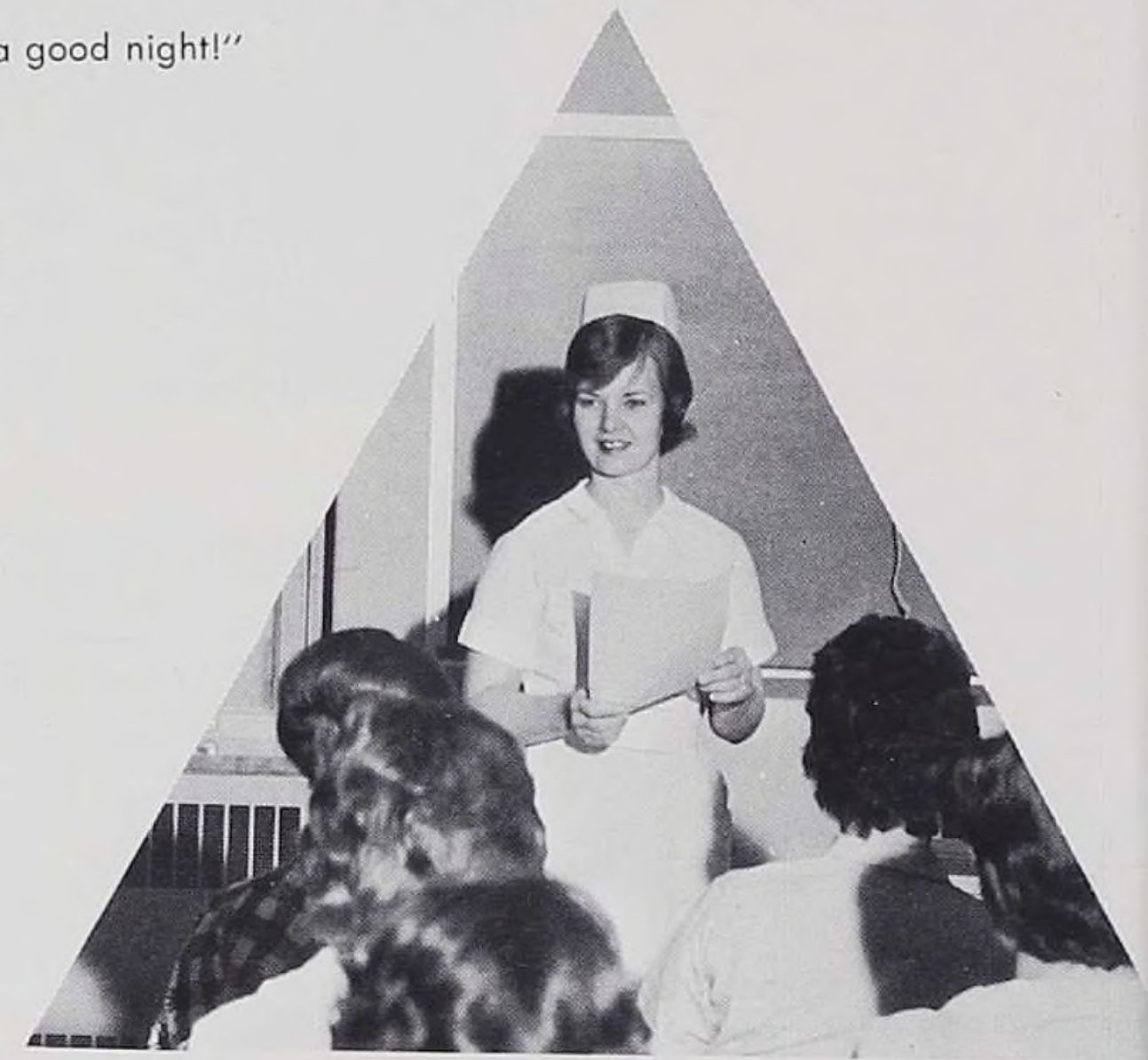
