## A DREAM COME TRUE

1973 was a year of real growth for Lutheran Hospital. Major changes to the physical appearance, additions to the physical plant and shifting of operations in the hospital witnessed years of planning becoming reality.

A bed replacement program begun in the spring of 1972 became a reality as the first patients were moved into the new accommodations. This bed replacement program is the latest phase in a continuing program of modernization that has been planned and underway by the hospital for nearly two decades. But in 1973 the real signs of this took shape. One of the new floors has been occupied and as the construction is completed, additional surgical and nursing units are shifting to the new and modern facilities. This phase involves only the move of patient beds as offices and ancillary medical services will remain in their present locations.

With the closing of Lutheran Hospital's student nursing program, another major change in the physical appearance of the hospital took place. The student residence was razed to make available additional space for parking. This space now provides convenient parking, easy access to the hospital entrance and supervised parking of all vehicles.

During the construction period, major additions were required to meet the demands of the new facility. New transformers, a new boiler and several elevators were installed to the physical plant to provide the necessary services for the new addition.

All of these changes to the physical appearance, additions to the physical plant and shifting of operations in the hospital are a dream come true. Initiated to insure the continuation of Lutheran Hospital's tradition of excellence in health care for many years to come.



## EDUCATION

1973 witnessed a change in Lutheran Hospital's role in health care education. Upon affiliating with several major educational institutions, Lutheran Hospital decided to close its own nursing school after 75 graduating classes. Lutheran Hospital has long realized the value of the partnership of education and quality of patient care and these new affiliations will provide the opportunity for Lutheran Hospital to expand its contributions to the education of a greater number of students.

The following are some of the 1973 educational programs Lutheran Hospital undertook on its own or participated in on an affiliated basis:

Medical Education--Programs in cooperation with the Medical College of Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine:

- \* 22 rotating residencies
- \* 3 permanent residencies
- \* 6 internships
- \* 26 preceptees
- \* 11 clinical fellows

Nursing Education--Programs by the Lutheran Hospital School of Nursing or in association with baccalaureate nursing schools as an extended unit:

- \* 38 registered nurses graduated from the hospital's School of Nursing.
- \* 231 University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee School of Nursing students comprised the second group to receive undergraduate clinical experience at Lutheran Hospital.
- \* 169 Marquette University College of Nursing students received clinical experience in the hospital's Psychiatric Care

Over the past several years a great number of improvements have been made in wages and benefits to keep pace with changes in the economy and other employers in the area. In keeping with its pattern in increased benefits, again in 1973, Lutheran Hospital made improvements in both wages and benefits.

periods and the following improvements in benefits were also made: an increase of \$1,000 of fully paid life insurance was added for all permanent full-time employees; all permanent full-time employees now receive six paid holidays and one personal day; a revision in the surgical insurance increased the coverage obtained in accordance with the Major Medical Plan; the hospital now contributes 50% to that portion of the family plan for Hospital/Surgical and Major Medical insurance coverage; and the number of days to attend the funeral of immediate members of the family was increased as well as liberalizing the number of members of the family included.

All of these improvements being put into effect are in accordance with Lutheran Hospital's philosophy that "change for the better is a constant thing at Lutheran Hospital."

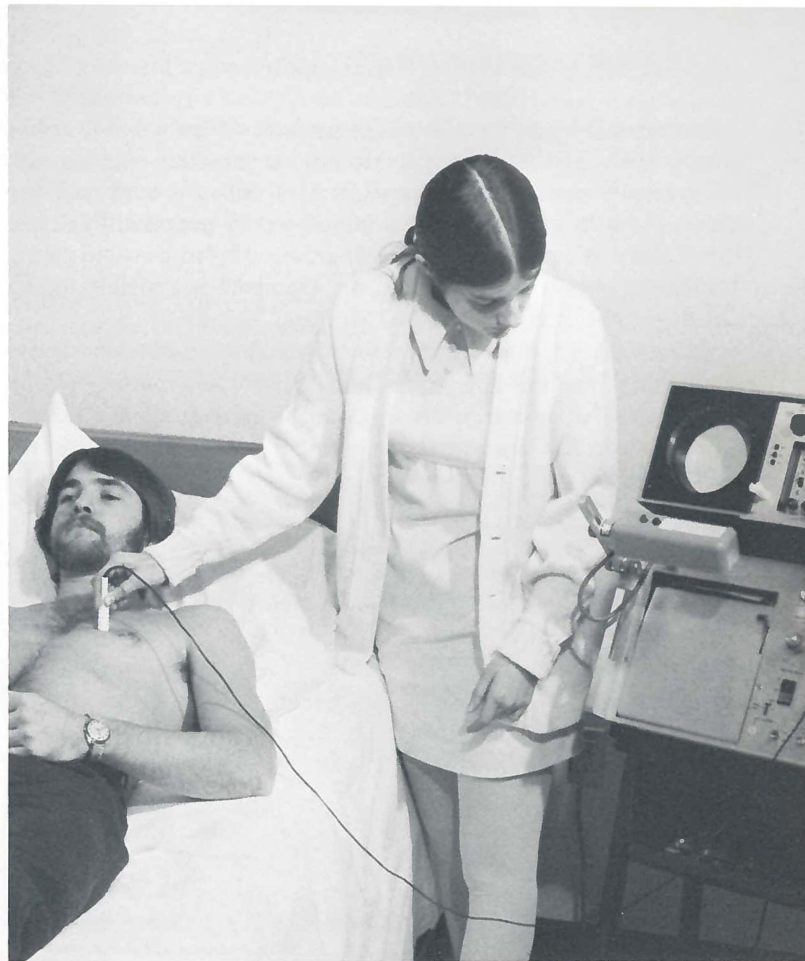
## CARDIOLOGY DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES BROADENED

Lutheran Hospital broadened its already aggressive attack on heart disease when it added a new service to its Cardiology department in 1973.

The service involves a relatively simple procedure called echocardiography. The technician administers a jelly on the patient's chest eliminating air which is a poor conductor of sound. The doctor places a transducer—a unit about the length of a cigarette and twice the diameter—in the jelly and adjusts the angle of the transducer to bounce echoes off the structure in which he is interested. The machine emits brief bursts of sound seven octaves higher than a man can hear and then listens for the inaudible echoes from tissue layers in the body. It displays what it detects on a cathode ray tube and inscribes the trace on sensitized paper tape. The patient feels nothing, suffers no effects and can be examined repeatedly without harm. Nothing is put inside him and he needs to stay at the hospital only about an hour.

This is a no-risk procedure which does not hurt the patient or pose any hazard to the technician or doctor using it. It is a noninvasive method of evaluating the heart and blood vessel system. The echocardiograph can produce some of the information customarily obtained by a surgical procedure called catheterization.

The equipment, donated by the Lutheran Hospital's Women's Auxiliary, shows promise in the areas of examining heart valves, an accumulation of fluid around the heart called pericardial effusion, heart enlargement and some inborn heart defects such as leaks between adjacent chambers.

## X-RAY ADDS XERORADIOGRAPHY UNIT

Lutheran Hospital broadened its services with a new Xeroradiographic unit. The xeroradiographic process produces an image by the interaction of x-ray or some form of radiant energy and the photo conductor selenium. The image is then permanently transferred through a multistep process to a sheet of plastic coated paper. Thereafter, a blue image of the part examined is available to the radiologist for interpretation and storage.

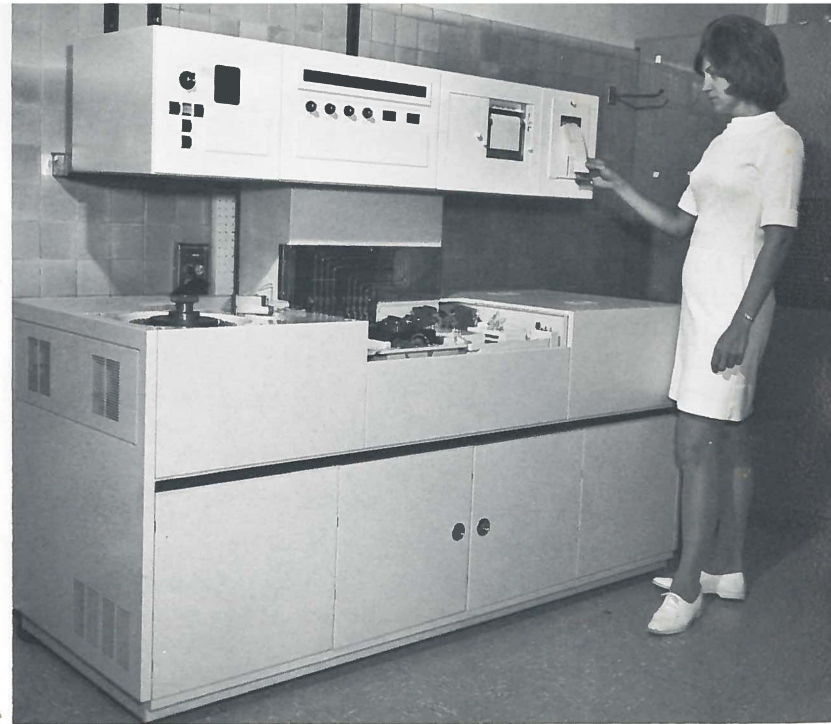
One of the major advantages of xeroradiography over film x-rays, is the fact that the images are more readily interpreted by the radiologist. The process is dry and can be carried out in a lighted room immediately adjacent to the examining room. Because she can see her work within 90 seconds, the technologist is more likely to furnish the radiologist with good images for interpretation.

Its application has been primarily in the area of xeromammography where it has been found to be superior to film mammography. Xeromammography offers advantages of broad exposure and recording latitude, emphasizes calcifications, shows greater resolving power for low contrast structures, reduces radiation dosage by approximately 60% and is easier to interpret. Xeromammography has also proven to be better in differentiating between benign and malignant lesions and detecting early occult carcinomas.

## LABORATORY INSTALLS A HEMALOG

The Laboratory has expanded its diagnostic capabilities with the installation of a new fully automated, broad spectrum profiling system for hematology and coagulation. This system, called a Hemalog, is capable of completing a 12-test profile at the rate of one per minute or process 60 samples of blood per hour.

instrument to work with provides for a standardization of hematology procedures; lessening the necessity of sample handling reduces the possibility of incorrect identification of samples and their results; and having all the samples self-contained permits the samples to be aspirated directly from the Vacutainers. Thus with this machine's addition only one technologist is required to keep the Hemalog operative. With this potential of increased lab volume no increase in personnel is required and those technologists presently on the staff can dedicate their time to more specific tests.
